Even More Great Object Lessons That Bring the Bible to Life

Object lessons are a powerful way to teach the Bible because they make the stories and principles come alive. In this article, we'll explore even more great object lessons that can help you bring the Bible to life for your students, children, or anyone else you're teaching.

Object Lesson: The Parable of the Sower

Materials:

- A handful of seeds
- A variety of soils (e.g., sand, potting soil, rocks)

Application:

The seeds that fell on the good soil represent those who hear the Word and understand it, and they bear fruit abundantly.

This object lesson can help us to understand the importance of planting the Word of God in our hearts and allowing it to take root. It can also help us to

be more patient and understanding with those who do not respond to the Word of God in the same way that we do.

Object Lesson: The Armor of God

Materials:

- A variety of objects that represent the different pieces of the armor of God (e.g., a helmet, a breastplate, a sword, a shield)
- A Bible

Instructions:

- Explain to your students that this object lesson is based on Ephesians 6:10-18, which describes the armor of God.
- 2. Show your students the different objects that represent the different pieces of the armor of God.


Object Lesson: The Good Samaritan

- 2. Show your students the different objects that represent the different characters




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
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
